Lligwy is ok on an Easterly, you'll find it just north of Benllech on Anglesey. It's cross on from starboard. Can get good steep waves which are a hoot for jumps. Always rig a bigger sail than you first think, as the wind always seems stonger on the grassy bank in front of the beach than it really is on the water!

The Estuary at Ynyslas (West Wales) goes off in an E or NE.... It was 35 knots there today and is always a good 10 knots more than anywhere else when the wind direction is E-NE.

Sometimes on cold, clear winter mornings, there can be a 25 knots wind blowing in the estuary when everywhere else is dead still... Even a mile away in Borth it can be still but the estuary is honking.

Good for intermediates too as its mainly flat water or choppy bump and jump conditions. Although mainly a high tide spot, it is sailable at all states of the tide if you know where the sandbanks are. There are more details on my site somewhere.
